Treasurer's Report—The Obsidians' financial outlook remains bright. As of September 30, our balance sheet had financial assets exceeding \$226,700 including a Capital/Contingency fund of \$88,600, an Endowment Fund of \$87,200 and a General Fund of \$21,800. During the past twelve months we had positive cash flow from operations of \$3,200. In addition, during the last year we received \$2,728 in donations from current members. Thanks to everyone for your continued financial and other support for the club.

President's State of the Obsidians Message—Looking over the past year, I cannot help but continue to be impressed by the willingness of so many who contribute to the spirit and welfare of our club. Everyone is busy with their own life but "What can I do to help?" is loudly heard. "Thanks" cannot be said often enough to our Board Members, Committee Chairs, Committee Members, trip leaders, members, and guests who have all contributed in making this a very enjoyable year. During the year, I've had the pleasure of meeting a member who was the club president in 1950. He has continued to follow and dearly care about the club. Meet also a member who shot us into Facebook because it was high time that we had a public access for sharing our fun and photos. The site, kept up-to-date with colorful photos and current announcements, is quite impressive. Meet a recent hike participant. She is 25 and wants to gain experience for a dream of a lifetime trip – backpacking in New Zealand. And meet one of our climbers tonight who will join our members who have summited all the peaks in Oregon. A few of our Committee Chairs are not here tonight. They are off on the extended trip to Klamath Basin. That is exactly what our club is about. We are here to explore and enjoy the outdoors. Many thanks to all of you who make that happen.

COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORTS

Highways and Byways By Bus—Liz Reanier The committee has scheduled nine trips: two 2-day, one 4-day, six day trips, and a Christmas luncheon for 2012. We still have three of those activities remaining. We continue to find different, interesting trips due to our trip leaders' talents.

We have had Verna Kocken on the Safety Committee, revisiting our standard procedures. Sharon Cutsforth has worked with the Jacobsens publicizing our trips, including exposure on the Obsidians website and soon to be on Facebook. The added publicity helped make our longest trip possible. Our leaders are always looking for interesting places to visit and keep their pencils sharpened to keep trips affordable.

Climbs—Sue Sullivan This has been a good year for climbs. One of our goals for the past two years was to foster more climb leaders, and this year the results of that effort are beginning to show. There were 23 climbs completed, with 9 people leading climbs. There were 11

climbs that were cancelled or rescheduled. We also had a successful Basic Mountaineering class this spring, run cooperatively with Eugene Mountain Rescue.

The climbs activities continue to be a source of potential new members, as 34% of climbs participants for 2012 have been nonmembers.

There have been two safety incidents reported on climbs this year. Luckily no one was seriously injured; however this serves as a reminder that climbing can be a dangerous activity. We continue to review our procedures for leaders and requirements for participants in order to minimize the risks for all.

In addition to completing a review of procedures, our plan for 2013 is to continue to work on our education process for climbers. We hope to have continuing education for skills beyond the basic ones to help people become more confident in their climbing abilities, so we can have a good base of people to draw upon for leading climbs.

Concessions—Lyn Gilman-Garrick Concessions had a successful year thanks in large part to the enthusiastic participation of members Patty MacAfee and Sharon Duncan. We had fun shopping for new items to add to our line of inventory, including cotton sweatshirts, sun hats, knit caps with wicking liners, lapel pins, and stylish new whistles. We gave away lots of items as prizes to help boost participation in events such as the bus rally and as thank-yous to members and nonmembers who went above and beyond. We set up our booth at summer camp and the Eugene Celebration, as well as most of the potlucks and ExploraTalks. We think we did a pretty good job of spreading the Obsidians spirit in the club and the community which we consider the main purpose of our committee.

Conservation, Science, and Education—Joella Ewing The Conservation, Science and Education Committee decided to hold six third-Tuesday ExploraTalks this year instead of ten to prevent them from occurring in the same week with fourth-Friday potlucks. Two major presentations in one week seemed like overkill. Attendance improved dramatically.

So far we've had excellent programs on The Gray Wolf in Oregon, Hidden Treasures of Buford Park, Dragonflies and Damselflies of the Willamette Valley, and the Mt. Pisgah Sighting Pedestal by its metal sculptor creator. Coming up this next Tuesday is on mushrooming between the Oregon coast and Cascades by Marcia Peeters, one of our area's premier mushrooming guides and instructors, complete with cooking demo and mushroom tasting.

We also sponsored two beach clean-up parties. We had a whale watching trip and Rick Ahrens guided us on a tour of Delta Ponds habitat. Lyn arranged two guided tours of Buford Park in the month following the Hidden Treasures presentation. Pat wrote conservation articles for the *Bulletin*.

Entertainment—Susan Wanser We've had a successful year of potlucks and speakers. I'm always eager to get referrals for speakers you've heard and enjoyed out in the community. I will also put out a plea for people willing to come early to the potlucks to help setup. This is a fun way to meet and visit with people in a less crowded and busy setting. Committee chairs, if you know of people who might like to get more involved and meet new people let me know and I could contact them.

Extended Trips—Chris Stockdale Our members and guests enjoyed several wonderful trips this year. The extended trips are extremely popular and generally fill up far in advance. Many thanks to the following leaders for continuing to come up with new ideas and for all the planning that is involved for a successful trip. Lana Lindstrom led

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the Newberry Crater Ski and Snowshoe trip in February. Chris Stockdale led the Mt. 

Climb: 12 miles, 3,900 ft.

IT IS REWARDING TO LEAD CLIMBERS ON THEIR FIRST TIME UP A PEAK! They experience the views from the sum-



mit for the first time so there are a lot of wows! and picturetaking. There is plenty of anticipation and some nervousness about the route, especially when they have heard stories about parts of a climb like the 'catwalk' on Broken Top. On this trip, four of the climbers were experienced mountaineers, but had never reached the summit of Broken Top. For the other two, this was their first roped climb. Starting at the Green Lakes trailhead, we hiked in to our campsite next to a spring east of Green Lakes, arriving with just a few minutes of daylight left. After setting up our shelters, we ate dinner at nightfall. Soon, we were treated with a big, bright, full moon rising in the 'V' between Broken Top's summit and the south peak. The moon illuminated the South Sister to our west and the landscape around us so well that we could walk about without lights. Some of us struggled to get a good night sleep with the bright moonlight shining in our faces, yet all were awake by 5:00 AM. We began climbing shortly after 6:00 and when we reached the saddle of the north ridge, we could see the devastation caused by the smoldering Pole Creek Fire to the northeast. Smoke was held down by the cool air, but still we saw a tree burst into a flaming torch about two miles away. As we neared the summit, we came across a scattering of blonde dreadlocks on the ground. We imagined that someone felt that achieving this high point was such a significant life event for them that they could only complete it by cutting their hair off! All of us made it to the summit by 9:00 and we stayed there nearly an hour, taking pictures and eating snacks, including 'socolate' (summit

chocolate). During our descent down the north ridge, smoke from the fire began rising and pushing westward. By the time we reached our camp, the brown haze had enveloped the summits of Broken Top and South and Middle Sisters. We had passed several climbers on our way down, including six Mazamas ascending into the smoke, and we were glad to have completed our climb early in the day. Back at camp, a few in our group were able to pack quickly so that they could enjoy a dip in the lake before the rest of us caught up. This was a great end-of-the-year climb made even better with a cheerful group of strong hikers, comfortable temperatures, and no mosquitoes! Klamath Basin Overnight Trip October 12. 2012

WE ENJOYED AN EASY UPSTREAM PADDLE on the Williamson, feeling wind in the willows and sun on our shoulders. We found trails of beavers, off duty from building elaborate mounds and stick dams that spanned the river. Resident bald eagles perched high in Ponderosa pines. Before the Klamath Irrigation Project of 1905, this area was a marvel, with the third largest salmon run in the West and over seven million waterfowl visiting the Basin each year to rest, refuel, and breed. The question now is: Klamath Lake and Tule Lake, pelicans or potatoes? The confluence of rivers and marshes, agribusiness and egrets is a complex one. Add to the mix the Native American Modoc and Yurok, Hoopa and Karuk, for whom salmon have been spiritual, nutritional, and commercial essentials. We were treated to a perfect autumn weekend

and sightings of thousands of birds on land and water and in flight, from grebes and coots to cormorants and white pelicans. A sight we won't soon forget is hundreds of white egrets perched atop masses of compacted bulrushes. From a distance, they appeared to be delicately balanced on just a single green rush. On our third day in the Basin, we visited the Wood River, a successful restoration project where a former cattle ranch has been restored to marsh. This rich and beautiful natural filter now sends the cleanest water in the area to the Klamath River and resident salmon. Our guides for this three-day exploration were Wendell Wood and his wife Kathy from Oregon Wild.
