

Without a quorum, the Board took no action but did discuss some topics.

Treasurer's Report:

The Board reviewed the bills.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Summer Trips (John Cooper): Work continues on Leader Training and Appreciation Night set for April 11. No time has yet been set. Dave Cooper and Kathy Randall are reviewing the Trip Leader Packet to look for updates that are needed. Janet Jacobsen has started trip recruitment for April and May with the big push by other committee members starting at the end of March.

Winter Trips (Dave Lodeesen): For the month of February (as of the moment of this report) the following has come to pass: 27 trips have been completed.

Climbs (Maryanne Reiter): The Climbs committee opened registration to Climb School on Feb 16. It was filled by 9 AM and in a few hours had 20 on the waiting list. Because of the demand, we added four more students bringing the total to 28. We also started adding Climbs to the schedule.

Trail Maintenance (Matthew Bell): There was one outing this past month in Hendricks Park to clear the trails and trail sides and ready the trails for re-opening hopefully soon.

Highways and Byways By Bus (Sharon Cutsforth): The Bus Committee has completed plans for eight 2017 bus trips. Details will be posted on the Obsidians website under *Bus Trips* and trip schedules will be available at the Bus Rally March 5.

Summer Camp (John Jacobsen): A registration form for Camp Funkhouser will be included with the April Obsidian *Bulletin* along with details about camp fees and other camping information.

Extended Trips (Lana Lindstrom): The registration for three Extended Trips opened in February. Two are fully subscribed with a waiting list. The third is almost full.

Conservation, Science, & Education (Jorry Rolfe): The February ExploraTalk with co-presenters Carrie Ward and John Leavens, introduced by Deb Carver, was well-attended. Forty people heard about what it takes to complete a Race Across America and a Denali climb.

Publications (Lou Maenz): The Bulletin committee mailed 411 *Bulletins*.

Entertainment (Lana Lindstrom): The February potluck presentation, *Hiking the Fife Trail in Scotland*, by Al LePage was very well-attended. We continue to evaluate the sound system proposals with the Lodge Committee Chair, including soliciting additional input from experts.

Membership (Laurie Funkhouser): The Committee had a meeting on February 22, 2017. Reviewed current documents and will be working to update/alter the renewal form.

Publicity (Janet Jacobsen): Last month, 50 copies of the February flyer were distributed at the Y. Darko continues to post the flyer at other places including REI. I leave copies by the entrance door of the Lodge. Members tell me they like to post a copy on their refrigerators to reference upcoming events. Encourage guests to view the calendar on our website or give them a copy when leading a trip.

Concessions (Carla Cooper): We are considering ordering commemorative ceramic coffee mugs and/or notecards for the Obsidians' 90th year. If anyone would like to give input on either of these items, please talk to one of the Concessions committee members.

Library/Historian (Lenore McManigal): All of the activities have been recorded which were in the February *Bulletin*.

Lodge Building (Dave Cooper): A special thanks to Janet Jacobsen and Jane Hackett for mopping the floors. And to John Jacobsen for having a ready supply of kindling and laying fires. Work will begin soon on replacing some storage area lighting with low profile LED fixtures. We will also be updating the lighting panel documentation and labeling light switches.

Lodge Grounds (John Jacobsen): Two work parties this month: Tuesday, Feb 7 - General cleanup for Lodge rental included picking up blowdown from latest wind storm and hauling last of stacked rounds from the December ice storm. Split kindling for Lodge. Thank you to Jim Northrup and Jim Whitfield for their help. Tuesday Feb 21 - A routine cleanup before the February ExploraTalk and potluck. Also re-dug/cleaned out all the drainage ditches around grounds—nothing like doing it in pouring down rain to see what's working and what's not. Thanks to Jim Northrup and Jim Whitfield for their help.

Safety (Lyndell Wilken): The annual safety committee meeting took place on January 6. The Accident Report Form was updated and changes were delivered to John Jacobsen so that the form could be updated online. The new copies were placed in all the first aid kits and the Obsidian box at the YMCA.

<u>Trail</u> Maintenance

Trail Maintenance: 2 miles, 500 ft. (Moderate)

UR GROUP MET UP AT THE MAIN SPENCER BUTTE PARKING LOT on a cold and calm morning. We had received permission from the city to work in some of the closed sections of the trails, namely the Tie and part of the Ridgeline trails. We broke into three groups to tackle the tasks for the morning. Clara and Laurie stayed at the trailhead to clean the stairs and kiosk. It was an amazing transformation. Janet, Dave, Tom, Jim, Wally, and Azara hiked up the main trail clearing drainage ditches and checking seven culverts before cleaning the stairs and summiting. Brad, Dan, Denise, Steve, Serge, Susan, and I donned hardhats and hiked along the Tie and Ridgeline trails nearly to Fox Hollow before working our way back. We raked out drainage features along, raked debris from, and threw debris away from the trail. Dan, Denise, and Serge worked extremely hard to clear much of the drainage



ditch just up the Tie Trail from the junction with the Ridgeline. Even with all that has been and was accomplished, there is still a lot of work that needs to be done to get the trails back into shape. FOUR OF US VOLUNTEERED TO HELP DEV COCHRANE, a Eugene Parks and Open Space staff person, repair damage from the storm on Blanton Trail. For the first project, we used

Pulaskis and grub hoes to grade out and level a hole caused by a root wad making it easier for hikers to pass. Later this



spring, Open Space plans to do more work to stabilize the section. We then moved up the trail for the more difficult project, removing a giant root wad blocking the trail. Dev worked with us to set up the GripHoist and cables between two trees and the root wad. Everyone took turns tightening the cables with the telescopic handle. My turn was ten seconds. I could hardly move the handle. Eventually, the root wad began to move. Camera ready and with big smiles on our muddy faces, we watched it roll over the side of the slope. It was hard to believe that we actually moved it. We scraped as much mud as we could from the trail. It was more difficult to deal with the mud on clothes, our faces, and shoes. THE NEW PEDESTRIAN SIGNS AT SALT CREEK ARE NOT ALWAYS OBEYED BY SOME DRIVERS. The strategy I use when crossing the Salt Creek car/people crossing is to walk down the middle of the bridge so the vehicle must stop; don't allow a car to push you to the side where you'll be squeezed between the car and the guard rail. It was 27 as we started up the trail that had already been broken by a previous group of snowshoers. About 1 1/2 miles up the trail, we veered off to the left to ascend Potato Hill. Here we had to break our own trail through fresh powder that was often a foot deep. The packed base snow was a good 5-6 feet in depth. We enjoyed clear views of Three-Fingered Jack and Mt. THE SNOWSHOE TRIP TO BRANDENBURG SHELTER at Ray Benson Sno-Park is a 7.4-mile loop. We got to the trailhead early and it was cloudy and 35 when we headed out on the



South Loop. There were several inches of perfect fresh white snow on the trail and trees, and a remarkable quiet in the air. Our strong leaders easily broke trail through the powdery snow. After a couple of miles the trail curved west, went past the place where the PCT intercepts, and came to a sign for Brandenburg Shelter in 1/2 mile. This trail circled around Brandenburg Butte. At one point near a sign post in the ground, the blue diamonds became difficult to spot. We kept to the right going around the butte and the diamonds soon reappeared. We followed the diamonds around to the north side of the butte then turned right a very short distance downhill to the shelter. There was a lone skier just leaving when we arrived at the shelter. He left us a cozy fire which everyone enjoyed, warming their hands during lunch. Early afternoon, as we traced our track back, the sun emerged along with patches of brilliant blue sky. THE TEMPERATURE WAS ABOVE FREEZING ALL DAY. It snowed, it rained, and we even got a glimpse of the sun. There was a little bit of new snow on the lower sections of the trail but after the junction with the Pretty Lake Trail where our trail turned north, we began to run into patches of hard snow and ice under the Douglas-firs. When the trail turned to the west and started to flatten out, conditions were great with about four inches of fresh snow. We reached Fawn Lake after 1 3/4 hours of skiing and took a short lunch break. Instead of skiing over the icy patches on the way back, we decided to head up to Pretty Lake and make a loop out of the trip. Unfortunately, by following compass bearings, we kept running into areas that were too steep, or thick stands of trees that made us veer off course. At one point, we saw fresh ski tracks. "Oh, look! Someone else has been here. Let's follow their tracks." And then, "Oh wait, those are our tracks." We saw a big hill and after rechecking our maps, we knew it separated us from Pretty Lake. 

WHAT BETTER WAY TO SPEND A RAINY SPRING DAY than with a trip to the museum—two museums, in fact. Our bus trip will take us to the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry and the Oregon Rail Heritage Center, both located within a few blocks of each other along the Willamette River in southeast Portland. At OMSI we will view the featured exhibit, The Art of the Brick. This is the world's largest display of LEGO art, with both original pieces of inspiring artwork as well as re-imagined versions of some of the world's most famous art masterpieces, made entirely from LEGO bricks. We will also see the big screen IMAX movie National Parks Adventure and take in a laser light show or see the stars in the Kendall Planetarium. Optional activities are a 45-minute tour of the USS Blueback submarine docked along the Willamette River (\$3.00), or a ride in a motion simulator (\$5.00). Be sure to tour the museum's regular science exhibits in the Turbine Hall and visit the Science Store for gift ideas. Lunch is on your own in the Theory Eatery (sandwiches, soups, salads, tacos, pizza, 11:00 AM to 2:00 PM) or bring your own lunch to eat in the visitors' lunchroom. 
