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# Richard Hughes: Our Lone Ranger for Bikeways

HILE MEMBER RICHARD HUGHES MAY NOT BE A MASTER OF DISGUISE nor a fighter of outlaws in the American West, he just might possess the silver bullet when it comes to cycling advocacy: single-handed persistence, passion, and promotion for riding and bikeways. His extensive local volunteer work ranges from serving as a former president of GEARS to the numerous ways he supports the Willamette Valley Scenic Bikeway (WVSB), a 132-mile bike route from Champoeg State Park to our nearby Armitage County Park.

It is because of this experience and volunteer work, along with his participation at all the annual bikeway conferences since 2013, that he has been recently recognized and appointed to the at-large seat on the State Scenic Bikeway Committee. In Oregon there are a total of 15 scenic bikeways, carefully selected and so designated by the Oregon State Parks and



Recreation Department. Each is categorized as mild, moderate, challenging or extreme. The WVSB is a moderate ride—not for absolute beginners, but not a major venture for regular cyclists.

A bike rider since the age of five, Richard definitely has chain lube on his fingers, now regularly cycling with local groups, friends, and clubs. He and wife Lana Lindstrom own one car, so both partners are committed to in-town biking and walking. His personal commitment to bicycling extends to helping those in our community who are underserved. He donates bike parts to a non-profit and has organized an annual ride which includes low-income and adaptive riders.

Richard invests a considerable amount of time and energy to bringing attention and making improvements to the WVSB, which was the first bikeway in Oregon and the nation. He launched a Facebook page that provides Bikeway updates, writes for <u>WeBikeEugene.org</u>, ensures that road signs are in place along the Bikeway, and solicits businesses to become *bike friendly*.

This recent official appointment to the 15-member State Scenic Bikeway Committee is a well-deserved recognition, a fitting testament to Richard's crucial understanding and prominent role with regard to bicycle tourism in Oregon. We wish him well as he continues his activism to promote quality cycling routes. So, 'Hi ho and away' and 'Ride into tomorrow today', Richard…maybe not a Lone Ranger anymore!

E HAVE RECEIVED NOTICE OF THE PASSING OF FORMER MEMBER CHARLOTTE MILLS. Her first activity with the club was in 1970, and during her membership years she earned the 10-peak award and participated in two summer camps. She also led eight trips. After moving from Eugene to Yachats she became one of the spokespersons for a group fighting to stop development that would block the historic Yachats 804 County Road and its potential as coastal walking trail near Yachats. After a lengthy legal fight the Oregon Supreme Court ruled in favor of the committee and that portion of the trail is now part of the Oregon Coast Trail System.

A historical marker is at Smelt Sands State Wayside as a tribute to the diligent efforts of Charlotte and other members of the 804 Committee.

### **Phantom Orchid**

FIRST NOTICED A WHITE-LOOKING CORAL ROOT on the Ridgeline Trail on a Spencer Butte hike June 12, 2013. It was later identified as phantom orchid, *Cephalanthera austiniae*, a saprophyte deriving nutrition from decaying matter. It goes unnoticed except for those who know where and when to start looking. Then the cameras come out as photographers capture the phantom white against the dark forest background. Ditte Lokon took this photo last year on June 6. The orchid is located on the Tie Trail, the trail that connects the Ridgeline Trail up to the main trail intersection at the meadow. At a sharp switchback where there is big blowdown and a 4-foot log cut to allow passage, start looking on your left, about 10-20 feet up the trail.
