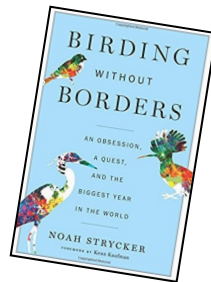

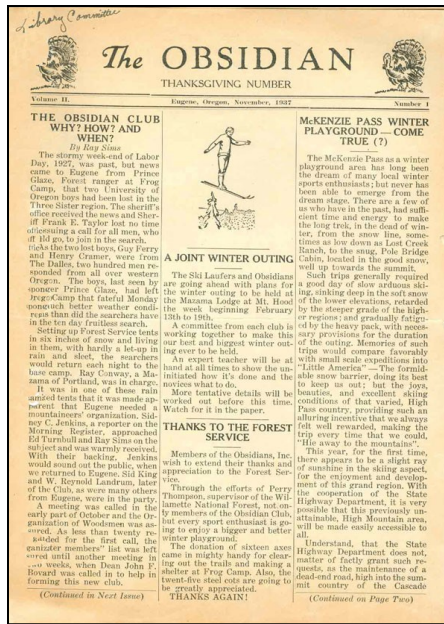
Obsidian Bulletin - November 1937

John Jacobsen

I T IS FUN TO LOOK BACK in our Bulletin archives to see what has changed (and what has not). Here we look back 70 years to November 1937, ten years after the founding of the club. The club publication was called *The Obsidian* then.

The lead item, *The Obsidian Club - Why? How? And When?*, is the first of a series of articles by Ray Sims on the early history of the club. These articles would later be compiled into a comprehensive volume. *A Joint Winter Outing* promoted an extended trip to the Mazama Lodge at Mt. Hood the following February, a trip more recently revisited and led by Sharon Ritchie. Another front page article thanks the Forest Service for donating 16 axes to the Obsidians to be used for clearing trails and for building a shelter at Frog Camp, and for 25 steel cots, the usage of which is not clear.

WE ALSO FIND an article about McKenzie Pass in which the Obsidians take a trip to Portland to make a proposal to the State Highway Department to keep the road plowed of snow to Frog Camp. The proposal was accepted, thus opening up a wonderful area for winter recreation and eventually led to the Obsidians using their upriver cabins during the winter.

TRIP REPORTS INCLUDED one for a moonlight wiener roast on top of Spencer Butte attended by twenty Obsidians. Fifteen members took an overnight trip to the coast, went crabbing and had the crab they caught for supper. Ninety members attended the Obsidian Halloween party and dance at the Knights of Pythias Hall. Entertainment included a juggler and singing. Food was reported good and plentiful at the midnight supper.

Forty members turned out for the club's first trail maintenance work party on November 7th at the Spring Lake Trail—anyone know where that is? Many more members were planning for more work on the trail the following three or four weekends.

The 1937 annual Obsidian meeting was preceded by dinner, singing and several violin selections. Election of club directors was more extensive than we deal with now, since all nine board members were elected each year. It seems the big event of the evening was the annual picture contest.

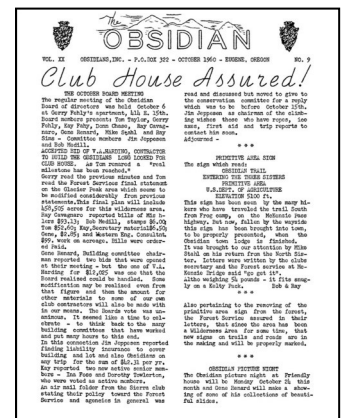
Publishing the Bulletin Before Computers

I WAS EIGHTEEN YEARS OLD WHEN I STARTED WORKING FOR MISHLER'S DUPLICATING COMPANY in 1959. Each month an Obsidian woman who wore her hair in a bun delivered the *Bulletin* to our office for me to type on a stencil. Her instructions were quite clear, "Absolutely four pages, no changes in the punctuation or margin size." Obsidian Mary Costello worked out of her home to do all of the artwork for our office. She designed *The Obsidian* newsletter masthead of the Three Sisters and the arrowhead. We could use the same stencil for around six months and then she had to make a new one. I had to estimate the spacing for the margins. The Obsidian woman with the bun would proof before we printed the 200 copies. If there was a mistake, we had to redo the whole page. I believe our office handled the mailing. A monthly bill was around \$17. I don't know when the name was changed to *The Obsidian Bulletin*.

I was encouraged to sign up for an Obsidian trip but it was not until years later my mother, Ethel Allen, persuaded my husband Paul and me, now living in Lincoln City, to go on an Obsidian bus trip. Since then Ethel, Paul and I have each received our 100 trip patch. We look forward to receiving our *Bulletin* each month and it is definitely more fun to read than to type.

Committee members, trip leaders, others who volunteer in a variety of ways deserve our acknowledgment and thanks.

TREASURER'S ANNUAL REPORT (Stewart Hoeg):

The Obsidians' financial outlook remains bright. As of September 30th, our balance sheet had financial assets of \$247,000 including a Capital/Contingency fund of \$51,000, an Endowment Fund of \$86,000 and a General Fund of \$28,000. Last year at this time we had financial assets of \$212,000 including a Capital/Contingency Fund of \$45,000, an Endowment Fund of \$86,000 and a General Fund of \$28,000. During the past twelve months we had positive cash flow from operations of \$1,300. In addition, during the last year we received \$6,200 in donations from our members. I would like to thank Don Doerr who is responsible for

keeping the books for summer camp and Sharon Cutsforth and Judy Phelps who jointly take care of the books for the Bus Committee. These three individuals are responsible for providing me with their respective committees' monthly financials for including in my over-all board meeting financial updates.

COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORTS

Bus Trips (Sharon Cutsforth): We have successfully completed seven of the eight bus trips scheduled for 2017. The remaining trip, Christmas Lights at Shore Acres, is scheduled for November 30–December 1. Bus trips have taken us to a wide variety of locations and sights: Bird watching at Klamath Falls, an impressive Lego art display and historic steam engines in Portland, the Children's Farm Home historic school, exploring the Santiam Wagon Road, a hop farm, a German meat market, a produce farm, a BBQ at Belknap Springs, thirteen days touring the National Parks of the Southwest, and much more. These trips have been successful because of the teamwork of the whole committee and the support of other Obsidians and guests. My grateful thanks to the people, who lead the trips, take reservations, provide refreshments, share their knowledge and experience, serve as secretary and treasurer, and all those who quietly work behind the scenes to make bus trips happen. The Bus Committee currently includes: Judy and Tom Adamcyk, Rick Ahrens, Ethel Allen, Barbara and Paul Beard, Sharon Cutsforth (chair), Verna Kocken, Lenore McManigal, Don Payne, Judy Phelps, Jim Northrop, Liz Reanier and Mary Ellen West. We also extend a warm welcome to Judy Garwood and Vern Marsonette who have joined the committee as we begin planning for 2018 bus trips.

Climbs (Maryanne Reiter): Thanks to the nine committee members! The Climbs Committee would not be able to meet its vital role in the club without their contributions of time and talents. Maryanne Reiter (Chair), Wayne Deeter, Brian Hamilton, Marci Hansen, Danni Harris, Marge Huseman, Juli McGlinsky, Doug Nelson, and Dalen Willhite. The Climbs Committee and Eugene Mountain Rescue (EMR) sponsored the 2017 Basic Climb School, which continued the long tradition of teaching safe, responsible and fun rock and snow climbing to club members and nonmembers. We increased the number of students to 28 for this year's climb school due to demand. In fact, the 2017 climb school filled within a few hours of going online on Feb 16. The Climbs Committee also cosponsored a crevasse rescue training with Eugene Mountain Rescue on Mt. Hood. This two-day field class was for Obsidian Climb leaders and included actual dropping into a very deep crevasse on the south side of Mt. Hood. We offered 21 summits and one conditioning hike this year. For the first time in many years, we offered all the Obsidian Climbs ten peaks needed for the 10 Peak Award! As of 10/13/17, five climbing trips were cancelled for weather related causes including extreme winds, fire, and snow. Climb School brought in a total of \$2,770 (not including expenses), which was split equally between Obsidians and EMR. The revenue from climbing trips is \$488, though there is one trip left for the season.

Concessions (Carla Cooper): In 2017 Concessions participated in six ExploraTalks, seven potlucks, the bus rally, backpack rendezvous, summer camp and one bus trip. We purchased new merchandise that included ball caps, cotton T-shirts, and 90th anniversary mugs. Because the main goal of Concessions is not to make a profit, but to promote the club, we have started giving first-time guests at potlucks a free notecard, we continue to give guest speakers at potlucks and ExploraTalks a gift, and we have offered deep discounts on older merchandise. Our 2017 sales to date have totaled \$1,148.44. Many thanks to the Concessions Committee: Judy Adamcyk, Keiko Bryan, Patty MacAfee, Darlene Mancuso, and Nancy Whitfield, and Carla Cooper, Chair.

Conservation, Science, & Education (Jorry Rolfe): This year, there were eight ExploraTalks, plus one recent presentation by a guest speaker, sponsored by this committee. A couple of the programs were very popular this year and your attendance is always encouraged and well appreciated! The Committee thanks the presenters, some of whom are Obsidians who have shared their activities and expertise. The final two ExploraTalks are: Renee Patrick of The Oregon Desert Trail will be here October 17, and Richard Hughes will talk about the best bike rides in Oregon on Tuesday, November 14. Jorry Rolfe served as the Obsidians' delegate to the Federation of Western Outdoor Clubs at the annual convention in August, and she was approved as the vice-president of the organization. Finally, we know that our membership is concerned about prospective changes to how wilderness is managed in the Willamette and Deschutes National Forests. We want you to know that this committee will be keeping the club informed of proposed plans or developments, comment periods, and decisions in the future through articles in the *Bulletin* and items or reports to the Board.

Entertainment (Lana Lindstrom): Thanks to very generous donations from Don Hunter and Ben Ross, we have a first-rate sound system with two portable microphones—we are thrilled! Bea Fontana built the custom cabinet to house the components. The old speaker and microphone continue to be used by Summer Camp. All the potluck presenters have been outstanding. Four of them attracted more than 75 participants each: Bill Sullivan, Bob Welch, Doug Crispin, and Al LePage. The potluck date has been officially moved from the fourth Friday of the month to the last Friday of the month. I am very appreciative of the following committee members who show up, set up, and clean up: Judy Adamcyk, Joella Ewing, Yuan Hopkins, Richard Hughes, Mary Livingston, Judy Ness, Emily Rice, Meg Stewart Smith, and Lana Lindstrom, Chair.

Extended Trips (Lana Lindstrom): We set a new record for Extended trips—seven in the first nine months of the year, including our first international one! Thanks very much to all the leaders: Alan Curtis, Chris Shuraleff, Chris Stockdale, Darko Sojak, Emily Rice, Evelyn Nagy, and Marianne Camp. One trip was cancelled due to smoke. Thanks to committee members for thoughtfully reviewing the proposals: Pat Esch, Kathy Randall, Diane Schechter, Chris Shuraleff, Chris Stockdale, Nancy Whitfield, and Lana Lindstrom, Chair.

Finance (Stewart Hoeg): The Obsidian Finance Committee during the past year was responsible for putting together the 2017 budget, recommending investments for the Endowment Fund and Contingency Fund and doing annual audits of Obsidian accounts. The committee completed successful 2016 audits of the general fund, endowment fund, contingency fund, extended trip fund, summer camp accounts, and bus accounts in addition to an audit of this year's summer camp. Thanks to committee members Dan Christensen, Don Doerr, Dave Hawkins, Lana Lindstrom, and Chair Stewart Hoeg.

Library/Historian (Lenore McManigal): All the trips and events members participated in the past year have been recorded. Members receiving trip and leader awards were notified. The list of deceased members was prepared for the meeting tonight. Ray Harris, the oldest living member, sent a framed photograph of his 1958 climb on Dogs Heads at the Coburg Caves. It now hangs in the main room at the Lodge. His first trip with the club was in 1950 to Mt. Baldy.

Lodge Building (Dave Cooper): My thanks to Doug Nelson, John Jacobsen, and Brian Hamilton for getting me up to speed on the procedures, history, and needs of the Lodge building. The biggest change in the Lodge building is the addition of a new sound system. Thanks to the generous gifts from former Obsidian president Ben Ross and the Estate of Don Hunter we could acquire speakers, amplifier and wireless microphones and have them installed. Special thanks to Bea Fontana for the design, construction, and installation of the cabinet housing this equipment. There were a few minor electrical changes this year. Some LED lighting fixtures have been installed to replace old incandescent lights. The lighting panel legends have been updated. Thanks to Carla Cooper and Carrie Soderlund for their help in tracing circuits. The Lodge was rented for non-Obsidian events or meetings five times this past year. These groups have always left the facility in good condition. We continue our long-time relationship with Eugene Mountain Rescue by providing use of the Lodge for meeting and training classes. Having many Obsidians who are also members of EMR makes this a mutually beneficial arrangement. I would like to thank every one of our members who contribute to the regular upkeep at the Lodge. The committees who sponsor

events always make the effort to leave the building ready for the next group. And for the occasional deep cleaning efforts, including mopping, windows, and more, it is great to have a call list of people willing to spend time keeping the building looking good. Also, thanks to Janet Jacobsen who takes care of the artwork displays in the Scherer Room.

Lodge Grounds (John Jacobsen): The Obsidian Grounds Committee continued with routine maintenance and upkeep of the Lodge grounds throughout the year. The ice storm at the end of last year caused a lot of damage to the oaks on the Lodge grounds resulting in a number of work parties to clean up the mess in the new year. Thank you to the Grounds Committee: Dave Cooper, Clara Emlen, and Jim Northrop. Thank you to people on the grounds work party call list for helping out at our many work parties.

Membership (Diane Schechter): Membership Status: 462 total members—431 active members, 6 honorary members, 8 junior members, 17 life members. 35 new members. Joined via: 14 Trips, 10 Climbs, 3 Bus, 2 Summer Camp. Heard via: 19 friend, 6 web page, 4 newspaper, 5 other, 2 mixed. Committee Members: Diane Schechter, Chair, Carla Lyon, Judy Sinnott, Tom Rundle, Daphne James, John Jacobsen.

Publications (Lou Maenz): In 2017 Publications created ten monthly *Bulletins*. The committee is divided into two sections; the Production team that edits and produces the *Bulletin* after receiving the monthly reports, articles, and photos. Thank you, Carla Cooper, Bea Fontana, Stewart Hoeg, Janet Jacobsen, Joanne Ledet, Jorry Rolfe and Ethel Weltman. The hard copies are folded and labeled for mailing by the Assembly team. Many thanks to Margaret Prentice the monthly team organizer, Clara Emlen the assistant team lead, Tom Adamcyk, Don Baldwin. Sharon Cutsforth, Yuan Hopkins, Joanne Ledet, and Lenore McManigal. (Both these groups were playfully acknowledged during the presentation of this report.)

Publicity (Janet Jacobsen): November 10th Mark Hougardy hosted the Obsidian table at the U of O Knight School of Law for a book presentation, *The Pacific Crest Trail: Exploring America's Wilderness Trail*. May 8th our committee met to discuss ways to publicize our club. Carla Cooper and Marci Hansen will facilitate Facebook. June 20th Darko Sojak, Steve Cordon, and Jim Northrop hosted the Obsidian table at the Museum of Culture and Natural History Solstice Celebration. June 3rd we led two get acquainted hikes with 13 guests. We have been asked to host more of these hikes. The Y Bulletin Board, REI board, monthly events flyer, website flyers and other venues were updated each month. Thanks to Chris Stockdale who sends our trip schedule to the *Register-Guard* each week. We also thank committee chairs who managed their own *Register-Guard* publicity and flyers. Janet Jacobsen, Chair. Carla Cooper, Elizabeth Glover, Mary Hamilton, Brian Hamilton, Marci Hansen, Mark Hougardy, John Jacobsen, Darko Sojak, Jorry Rolfe.

Online (Wayne Deeter): I thank my committee members for their help in running the Online Committee: John Jacobsen (database maintenance and development), Marci Hansen (Facebook page), Jan Anselmo (photo albums), and Shellie Robertson (planning). Access to our online sign-up system has

been switched to Secure Sockets Layer (<https://>), which our database vendor is now providing at no cost to us. We are currently looking at using an email vendor as an alternative to using the web hosting vendor for our email lists. After we convert to a new email system we will research moving our main website to another system, possibly based on a Content Management system. This will allow us to involve more people in maintaining our web pages.

Safety (Lyndell Wilken): The Safety Committee reviewed the Safety manual and the Accident Report Form in January 2017. Minor changes were made to bring the Accident Report document up to date with technology. First Aid kits were checked and evaluated in January and there will be ongoing work done to update the kits with current materials. The Summer Camp first aid kit is under review for renewal. The Obsidian's offered an eight-hour Wilderness Emergency Preparedness seminar in February 2017 which was attended by 18 members. There has been discussion by the board about an additional wilderness first aid session for members and nonmembers to be held at the lodge in April of 2018. Safety Committee members: Maryanne Reiter—Climbs, Sharon Cutsforth—Bus Trips, Mike Smith—Winter Trips, Judy Terry—Summer Trips, Pat Esch—At Large, Lyndell Wilken—Committee Chair.

Summer Trips (John Cooper): The 2017 season for Summer Trips has been successful despite rescheduled and cancelled trips (there were 17 cancellations some due to forest fires.) A variety of trips did take place. As of Oct. 1, 2017, 144 trips were scheduled, led by 35 leaders. There were 974 members and 155 nonmembers who participated. There have been five backpacking trips, five bicycle trips, 108 hikes, two canoe/ kayaking outings, one car camp, and for the first time one dog-friendly hike. Janet Jacobsen hosted two get-acquainted hikes from the lodge in one day. \$1,369 in fees have been collected. Leadership Training took place in April and for the second year Mark Hougardy put on the Backpackers Rendezvous. Special thanks to Chris Stockdale for setting up the guidelines and leading the club's first dog-friendly hike. Thanks to all the committee members: Janet Jacobsen, Mike Smith, Lana Lindstrom, Dave Cooper, Jan Anselmo, Judy Terry, Joella Ewing, Jane Hackett, Kathy Randall, Lyndell Wilken, and John Cooper, Chair.

Summer Camp (John Jacobsen): The 2017 Summer Camp in the North Cascades of Washington was enjoyed by 89 Obsidian summer campers and guests. This was a primitive camp, the first in several years where we needed to bring in all our own facilities. Thank you to Don Doerr and Lana Lindstrom, fellow Summer Camp Committee members; also to the Summer Camp setup crew and all the lead people who made summer camp happen. Currently there are no plans for a Summer Camp in 2018. If anyone has ideas for a camp next year let me know.

Trail Maintenance (Matthew Bell): During the past year the Trails Committee has been busy working to improve trails in Ridgeline Trail system parks. We held outings on National Trails Day and National Public Lands Day. Mark Hougardy deserves special recognition for taking the initiative to coordinate an overnight trip to work on the Alder Creek restoration project with the Oregon Natural Desert Association. This year's highlights included an estimated \$8,031 worth of volunteer labor from 353 volunteer hours! Unique participants totaled 38 with 29 being members and nine nonmembers. 2017 Trail Maintenance Committee: Dan Gilmore, Clara Emlen, Todd Larsen, Pat Soussan, and David Cooper.

Winter Trips (Dave Lodeesen): The Winter season of 2016/2017 was one of the best snow years for activities other than hiking in many years. The number of snow activities was double or even triple that of recent seasons. The final tally is: hikes: 74, snowshoe: 15, cross country ski: seven, trail maintenance: one. Total Trips: 97. Total fees collected: \$996. Total participation of members: 824, nonmembers 68. The Winter Trips Committee: Janet Jacobsen, Darian Morray, Michael Smith, Judy Terry, and Dave Lodeesen, Chair.

Willamette Pass Winter Trail Volunteers

THE WILLAMETTE PASS WINTER TRAILS PROGRAM involves 23 volunteers with cross country and snowshoe experience. Their focus is on maintaining the diamonds and signage along 70 miles of marked winter trails in the Willamette Pass Recreation area. Each trail has an adopter who keeps track of the trail conditions and submits reports with work they have done and work that still needs to be completed. In addition there are six shelters and the Warner Mountain Lookout that have been adopted by volunteers to assist the forest service in caring for the structures.

When a volunteer decides to work on their trail, they often recruit fellow volunteers to assist, making it a group effort. In the fall a Saturday work session is held to address bigger projects like adding shakes to the roofs of the shelters, replacing diamonds and clearing branches away with the use of ladders.



This work session helps compensate for the low-snowpack years where diamonds can’t be reached.

The trail system includes areas like Gold Lake, Marilyn Lakes, Westview and Bechtel trail areas, Rosary Lakes, Maiden Peak, Fuji Mt, Waldo Lake and Twin Peaks. The combination of the trail system and the shelters are one of the best winter recreation experiences in the country. The Willamette Pass Winter Recreation Map is an excellent resource to take along when skiing or snowshoeing the trails. The maps can be purchased at the forest service headquarters and REI.

The Board approved the minutes for September and the Annual Meeting.

Treasurer's Report (Stewart Hoeg): The Board approved payment of the bills.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Summer Trips (John Cooper): Through Oct. 11, 127 trips have been approved. There were 1,045 members participating with 164 nonmembers participating. \$1,449 in fees has been collected. 19 trips remain to be completed.

Climbs (Maryanne Reiter): Climbs had several trips cancelled in August and Sept. due to weather related issues. There were four climbs from August 1–Oct 17 with total revenue of \$87. There is one last climb scheduled for Oct.

Trail Maintenance (Matthew Bell): There was one outing this past month. We worked to clear the drainage ditches and culverts along the Main Trail in preparation for the City resurfacing the trail.

Bus Trips (Sharon Cutsforth): We have completed seven of the eight bus trips scheduled for 2017. The remaining trip is scheduled for Nov. 30–Dec. 1. Total participants to date is 192: 153 members and 39 nonmembers. Total fees collected to date: \$953.00. We have begun planning for 2018 bus trips.

Extended Trips (Lana Lindstrom): Eight Obsidians went on Darko Sojak's very successful, fun Extended Trip to Croatia in September. \$40 was collected in trip fees.

Conservation, Science, & Education (Jorry Rolfe): There was a record attendance at the ExploraTalk with Noah Strycker, "Birding Without Borders", on Sept. 19. Forty attendees heard Russian guest speaker, Dr. Nadja Nikolaeva, hosted by member Alan Curtis on Sept. 29. Renee Patrick with the Oregon Desert Trail presented on Oct. 17. We conclude that the accounting system in place has effective controls and has provided accurate information regarding the summer camps of 2016 and 2017. Also, we have added a federal money market account at Vanguard and intend to invest a portion of the money currently being held in our US Bank checking account. We have the ability to electronically transfer between these two accounts at no cost within 2–3 business days. The Vanguard account is currently paying 1% annual interest."

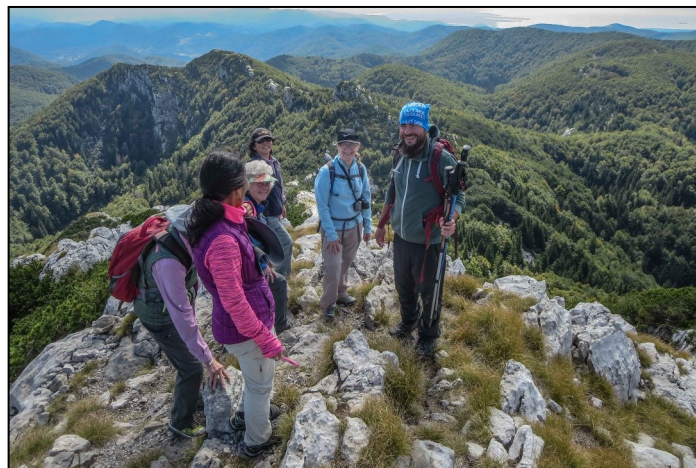
Hikes: Easy to Difficult, 5 miles to 14 miles

OUR FIRST CHALLENGE WAS TO DRIVE 660 MILES to the White Mountains. We broke that up with an overnight stop in Reno, Nevada. Then with an early start the next day, we covered miles and by afternoon began the winding, very scenic drive into the Inyo National Forest near Big Pine, California. We headed for the Crooked Creek Research Station (CCRS) of the University of California, located at 10,150 feet elevation. That was our home for the next four nights. We enjoyed the nice accommodations and well-prepared meals by the resident cook. Our first hike, an easy five miles, was the Methuselah Trail which wound through a bristlecone pine forest. This forest was unlike any others we had seen, as the trees had living branches on one side and exposed wood on the windward side. Yet every tree was beautiful and different in appearance from the others. The oldest living tree on Earth, over 4,800 years old, and named *Methuselah*, was located somewhere on this trail (but is not identified to protect it from vandalism). The next day we drove higher, to 11,300 feet, and took a short hike to see the *Patriarch tree*. This tree has the distinction of having the largest girth of all the bristlecone

pinos. We continued on to an open ridge for lunch and a spectacular view to the west of the Sierra Nevada Mountains with their many snow-capped peaks and ridges. Croatia's Natural Wonders

September 20-28, 2017

EIGHT OF US VISITED FIVE CROATIAN NATIONAL PARKS. The Risnjak National Park in Risnjak Mountain Range is named after a rare animal that inhabits its woods – the lynx (Ris in Croatian). Park is located in Gorski Kotar, the most mountainous and heavily forested region of the country, about ten miles inland from the Adriatic Sea. Everybody enjoyed great weather and 360° view from the top. North Velebit National Park is Croatia's youngest National Park. The area is rich in karst phenomena, outstanding biodiversity, and exquisite nature on a relatively small area. The Park is crisscrossed with numerous hiking trails. We hiked the famous Premuzic trail, marvelously built in difficult terrain. Light drizzle did not spoil our long day in Plitvice Lakes National Park. We hiked boardwalks, bridges and paths around 16 emerald green and opal blue travertine lakes, separated by over 90 waterfalls.
