

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Winter Trips Driving Safety

HIS TIME OF YEAR MANY SKI AND SNOWSHOE TRIPS head L out to or over one of the mountain passes. It's very important for drivers to have a proper vehicle equipped with dedicated winter tires and/or tire chains. Our cars, SUVs, and trucks come equipped from the factory with all season tires. Note: these are NOT winter tires and you must carry tire chains to be legal in the State of Oregon if approaching any of the various mountain passes during the winter months. This includes vehicles with AWD or 4WD. The only exception to the tire chain law is if you install dedicated winter tires on your vehicle; these have the special designation icon (threepeak mountain with a snowflake) on the sidewall of each tire. These tires are sometimes referred to as snow tires and can be studded or stud-less. The main difference between winter tires and your typical all season tires is in the rubber compound that the tires are made from. Winter tires use a rubber compound that stays soft in cold weather so the tires can grip icy or snow-packed road surfaces far better than all season tires. They also have deeper lugs to bite into and release snow for traction. Be mindful that you still must use caution when driving in winter conditions by slowing your speed, especially on the downhill, and not tailgating. So be safe and legal by having tire chains and/or winter tires. Because even if the roads are plowed and dry, often the Sno-Parks are not, and getting stuck in one of those can cost you up to several hundred dollars to get a tow truck out there to pull you out.

Where Did Obsidians Ski in 1941?

AND LAKE ON THE MCKENZIE PASS WAS THE FAVORITE PLACE TO SKI.

An earlier snowfall in December 1940 had faded away, but by New Year's Day the portable rope tow newly purchased by the Obsidians had been in use for three weekends. "Then, an ugly rumor began circulating. The road wouldn't be opened to Hand Lake the next Sunday. With no snow at White Branch this looked mighty serious, but with support from the Greyhound Bus line the highway commission was prevailed upon to plow the road out another week-end. A flying trip to Hand Lake to bring out the ski tow was made necessary by the closing of the highway, which was, this writer believes, absolutely unnecessary because there was only about 12 inches of snow in the road, and 30 inches on the level. This closure should be heartily opposed and protested by every Obsidian in every way. Only by sticking together and fighting for a winter road to the McKenzie summit will the area be available to Skiers in the years to come." obsidians.org/bulletin/Issues/1941-2:1

Willamette Pass Ski Area officially opened in 1941 with a handful of rope tows. Roy and Edra Temple were the ski area's first owners, followed by George Korn who owned and operated the ski area for more than twenty-five years. George Korn and his brother Henry were active Obsidian members.

Hoodoo Ski Area was developed in 1938 by a group funded by another Obsidian, Ed Thurston of Bend. Many Obsidians

thought it took too much time to drive to Hoodoo for just one day of skiing. The Clear Lake Cutoff, a gravel road heading north from Belknap Springs to US 20 was paved in 1962, making Hoodoo a popular choice.

First Aid Kits

THE OBSIDIAN FIRST AID KITS HAVE BEEN INVENTORIED AND RESUPPLIED for 2018 outdoor club activities. The kits are available to all trip leaders who are interested in using them while leading an event. When you become a leader information is given on where to check out the first aid kits and the procedures for using them. The Obsidian kits are a back-up in case participants are not carrying their own first aid supplies. Participants are encouraged to carry a first aid kit that meets their specific needs during an activity. If something does happen on an Obsidian-led trip then the personal first aid kits can be combined with the leader's Obsidian kit to take care of the problem. Leaders that have their own kits are not required to use the Obsidian kits but they should have a similar inventory. Listed at right are the contents of the Obsidian first aid kits. The list provides a guideline for all members to use when putting their own personal first aid kits together.

Willi Unsoeld Book Donated to Obsidian Library

ROSE MARIE MOFFITT DONATED THE BOOK, Wild Adventures We Have Known: My Life with Willi Unsoeld by his wife, Joelene Unsoeld. Rose Marie and her husband, Dick, now deceased, were at the 50th Obsidian anniversary banquet in 1977 when Willi was the featured speaker. The book with CD can be found in the bookcase at the Lodge.

Willie told of his climbing experiences as a youth in the Eugene area, often going with the Obsidians on exciting adventures into the Cascades. Often his boots were too large having been handed down from older climbers; and food was of heavy consistency swallowed in fast gulps causing heartburn and many "burps" on the mountain. Alpenstocks were not unheard of but were usually make-shift affairs made of tree branches found in the woods as he trampled along with his friends...equipment in those earlier days consisted of an ax, a rope, and trouser seat. Willi was on an Obsidian North Sister climb in 1942 with Bob and Laurence Moffitt. In 1963 he made the first ascent of Mt. Everest's West Ridge. He died in an avalanche on Mt Rainier March 4, 1979. Obsidian hikes to Chip Ross Park in Corvallis include a stop at a monument in Unsoeld's honor.

President Laurie Funkhouser called the meeting to order. Also in attendance were: Kathy Randall, Stewart Hoeg, Kathy Hoeg, Jorry Rolfe, Carla Cooper, Daphne James, Wayne Deeter, Matt Bell, and Janet Jacobsen.

Treasurer's Report (Stewart Hoeg): Stewart presented the preliminary budget for 2018. The Board will act on the budget at the January meeting. The board approved payment of the bills.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Summer Trips (John Cooper): All 149 summer trips have been completed and approved. \$1,656 has been collected in trip fees. All trip reports have been submitted.

Winter Trips (Dave Lodeesen): Ten hikes and two bike trips were completed in November. 130 members and 15 nonmembers participated. \$162 in trip fees were generated. Going forward, 35 hikes, four cross-country ski, and two snowshoe trips are scheduled.

Climbs (Maryanne Reiter): The Climbs Committee met on Nov. 16 to wrap up the past climbing season and to start planning for the next. We covered lessons-learned from the past season, such as: wind and fire can prevent climbs. We also started the discussion on how to generate more interest in climbs for the community and how to attract more leaders.

Trail Maintenance (Matthew Bell): There was one outing this past month working to plant native species in slash burns in Wild Iris Ridge Park.

Bus Trips (Sharon Cutsforth): All eight bus trips for 2017 have been completed. The committee is working on planning for 2018 trips.

Extended Trips (Lana Lindstrom): Two ski/snowshoe overnight trips have been scheduled for 2018: Big Lake, January 14–16 led by Diane Schechter and Mt Hood Kiwanis, March 8–11 led by Lana Lindstrom. Details are under *Extended Trips* on the home page.

Conservation, Science, & Education (Jorry Rolfe): The November ExploraTalk brought 29 people to the Lodge to hear Obsidian Richard Hughes present on finding the best bike routes in Oregon.

Entertainment (Lana Lindstrom): Pat Boleyn presented an interesting program on hiking with the Maasai youth in Africa. \$48 was collected.

Membership (Diane Schecter): Reminder emails were sent in mid-November to members who had not renewed. Members who have not renewed by the December 8 deadline will become inactive. As of November 29, 2017, renewal status is: paid - 364, not paid - 79. active member - 432, honorary member - 6, junior member - 11, life member - 1, total members - 466. The Board and Committees have been provided with suggestions and comments from the membership renewal forms and a list of members and their volunteer interests.

Concessions (Carla Cooper): Primarily due to sales of the

90th Anniversary cups, November sales totaled \$548.63. Many thanks to Judy Adamcyk for selling cups and t-shirts on the Shore Acres bus trip.

Finance (Stewart Hoeg): The Finance Committee prepared a preliminary 2018 budget for presentation at the December board meeting and began working on a proposed club investment policy.

Library/Historian (Lenore McManigal): All of the trips, climbs, etc. from the November *Bulletin* have been recorded.

Lodge Grounds (John Jacobsen): The tree cleanup/ restoration work authorized at the October Board meeting was completed Monday, November 6 for \$1,200. We had a grounds work party Saturday, November 11 to haul the rounds from the tree cleanup work, planting-bed weeding/ cleanup/barking, tree/bush pruning and gutter cleanout on both the storage garage and the Lodge. Thanks to Ben Brown, Dave Cooper, Clara Emlen, Brenda Kameenui, Doug Nelson and Jim Northrop for helping out. Special thanks to Clara Emlen for her continued work on her own to clean out the drive area coming into the Lodge.

Publications (Lou Maenz): The November *Bulletin* was mailed November 8. There were 201 copies sent for a total cost of \$49.76. The folding committee was made up of Clara Emlen, Margaret Prentice, Sharon Cutsforth, Tom Adamcyk, Don Baldwin and Jan Danforth.


