**W** E ARE GOING BACK TO THE SAWTOOTHS OF IDAHO for Obsidian Summer Camp for the sixth time. Rick Ahrens' summer camp history shows five previous Summer Camps in the Sawtooths: Camp Chase in 1961 at Redfish Lake, Camp Lowry in 1983 up the Yankee Fork of the Salmon at the Bonanza Campground, Camp Montgomery in 1994 at the Chemeketan CG, the Three Sages Camp in 2000 at the Chemeketan CG and Camp Hamilton in 2008 at Bonanza CG. I have attended the last four of those camps and look forward to returning to one of my favorite Summer Camp locations at the Chemeketan CG.

The Chemeketan Campground, between Stanley and Ketcham, Idaho, is at the headwaters of the Salmon River. There is something for everybody in the Sawtooths! Hiking, kayaking, rafting, mountain biking, soaking in hot springs, climbing Mt. Borah (Idaho's highest peak), viewing wildlife, visiting the Yankee Fork Gold Dredge and Custer ghost town, taking the boat across Redfish Lake to hike or rock climb, and possibly visiting the White Clouds Mountains.

#### ETHEL ETTER ALLEN 11/1/1919–1/15/2020

**THEL WENT ON HER FIRST OBSIDIAN BUS TRIP IN 1995, AND ON HER 187<sup>TH</sup> BUS TRIP THIS PAST DECEMBER.** She received her 100-trip patch in 2004. She was a member of the Bus Committee for many years and also led ten trips, several with a focus on pioneers. She led a stage coach road themed bus trip in 2001 to the Trinity Alps and Weaverville that included a visit to the original Etter ranch home where her family lived during the 1920s. Ethel's trip reports are filled with appreciative observations that conclude with a positive phrase and a comment on punctuality: *As all good things come to an end, we returned to Eugene at 5:15 PM*.

Anyone who traveled on the Obsidian bus with Ethel was welcomed with her smile and gracious style. She was always willing to share stories about her experiences. Bus riders also met her family members—Obsidians Barbara and Paul Beard and their daughter Paula.

Friends and relatives filled the Lodge for her 100<sup>th</sup> birthday party this past November. During the gathering all were inspired watching Ethel move so elegantly with her tai chi class. In December she went on her last bus trip to Christmas Storybook Land in Albany, and even attended a Bus Trip Committee meeting at the Lodge.

She is predeceased by daughter Nancy Schreiner, also an Obsidian member. She is survived by two daughters, Barbara (Paul) and Bonnie (Mike) and son-in-law, John Schreiner; ten grandchildren; fourteen great-grandchildren; ten great, great grandchildren; many nieces, nephews, grand-nieces, and grand-nephews. A celebration of Ethel's life was held on January 25 at Ebbert United Memorial Methodist Church. Ethel's family played several moving musical numbers. Barbara (bells), Paul (piano), and Paula (flute) played Ethel's favorite song poem, *Trees*.

Cork and Carolyn led a Mt. Tom loop hike in 2006 and 2007 from their home on Mt. Tom Road. It was a unique experience for hikers to visit their special places on the hike to the ridge for views of the coast range and valley floor. #### **TREASURER'S REPORT (Stewart Hoeg)**

Stewart reviewed the year-to-date income and expenses as well as the balance sheet. The Board approved paying the bills.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

**Bus Trips (Sharon Cutsforth & Jim Northrop):** Bus Trips successfully completed seven trips this year, after having to cancel the March trip to Klamath Falls and the March Bus Rally because of the snow storm. There was a total of 190 participants and \$585 in fees were collected and forwarded to Obsidians, Inc. Our finances are well in the black as we begin planning trips for 2020. Our next planning meeting is scheduled for Thursday, January 16 at the Lodge. The committee is planning the 2020 Bus Rally for Sunday, March 15, also at the Lodge.

**Climbs (Maryanne Reiter):** The Climbs Committee will kick off 2020 with a meeting on January 22.

**Concessions (Carla Cooper):** Concessions sold \$16 worth of goods in December. We will be meeting in early January to order new merchandise.

**Conservation/SciEd (Jorry Rolfe & Kay Coots):** We start the year with an ExploraTalk on Tuesday, January 21. Mike Houck, an urban naturalist, joins us from Portland to speak about the Portland-Vancouver region's system of parks, trails and natural area—the Intertwine.

**Lodge Building (Dave Cooper):** Received \$140 rent from the McKenzie River Trust for February 8, 2020.

### Mileage Reimbursement Change

**I** N LATE 2008 THE OBSIDIANS FORMED AN AD HOC COMMIT-TEE TO ADDRESS SUGGESTED MILEAGE REIMBURSEMENT RATES given dramatic increases in gasoline prices. The goal was to create a formula as a basis for the club's suggested reimbursement rate.

The committee recommended a formula of 1/6 of the IRS's annual mileage reimbursement rate for individuals. This formula was based on the committee's assumption of four people in a car and that roughly 1/3 of the IRS's number for reimbursement was based on fixed costs.

The Board has reviewed this calculation annually since 2009. Although the IRS reimbursement rate has varied annually, the result of the calculation has always rounded to \$.09 per mile until now.

Due to the IRS's new, higher reimbursement rate for 2020, the Board decided at the January meeting to increase the reimbursement rate for drivers to \$.10 per mile.
