Summer Trips—Into the Future

MOST OF THE BEST ADVICE I'VE EVER RECEIVED WAS SIMPLE. *Be Prepared* is a good example. A prepared leader is one who knows the trip they plan to lead well enough to anticipate any contingencies that might arise. Numerous problems can be avoided by screening participants for their ability/preparedness level before you meet at the departure point. This is especially true for difficult hikes, or hikes in remote locations. I encourage all leaders to make sure that new participant/members are referred to the online flyer: *General Trips Information*. This *Are you Prepared for an Obsidian Trip* form is available online in the *Members Only* area under *Documents/Summer Trips Leaders Packet* as a printable PDF file.

This year we will not be mailing new leader packets to each and every leader as has been the custom for the past several years. The leader packet is unchanged from the past two seasons. Individual forms, or an entire set of forms can be printed from PDF files available on the Obsidian web site in the *Members Only* area under *Documents*. Once summer season begins, a limited number of hard copies of summer trips leader packets will be available in the green box at the Y.

Summer Trips Committee volunteers will soon be contacting leaders (and new leader prospects) encouraging them to schedule their Obsidian summer trips soon. The summer trips season begins April 1st. Remember to submit all the necessary information when submitting a trip for the

committee to consider for our 2014 schedule. Many of the most popular hikes have templates with basic stats like trail miles and elevation for a typical hike. It is the leader's responsibility to verify that information contained in templates matches the actual hike/route they plan and make adjustments as needed. Otherwise, submit trips to summertrips@obsidians.org and include: leader's name and assistant leader (if you are so lucky), day/date of trip, name of trip, type of trip (hike, backpack, canoe/kayak or other), trail miles, difficulty rating (easy, moderate, difficult), and round trip driving miles. It's pretty much standard fare for experienced leaders.

Other than the distribution of paper, little else has changed this year. Compared to the past two summer seasons, we plan to save about \$150 just in postage.

We also plan to offer leader workshops several times throughout the summer. These workshops are available to answer questions, brainstorm solutions, and offer face-to-face support for leaders, new and old. If you have a date that you know you will be available and would like to attend a workshop please let me know. I will be adding workshops to the schedule in March. You can also call me if you have questions.

Our trip leaders and volunteers define the Obsidians. Thank you for all you do! Our leaders make the Obsidians a great organization ... send those summer trips in soon, and get on the schedule!

50th Anniversary of the 1964 Wilderness Act

ON SEPTEMBER 3, 1964 PRESIDENT LYNDON B. JOHNSON SIGNED INTO LAW THE WILDERNESS ACT.

This historic bill established the National Wilderness Preservation System (NWPS) and set aside an initial 9.1 million acres of wild lands for the use and benefit of the American people. The Wilderness Society had a major role in passing the 1964 Wilderness Act. Now, 50 years later and as a result of America's support for wilderness, Congress has added over 100 million acres to this unique land preservation system. (USDA Forest Service website)

Charles Clark, Wilderness Resource Steward of Willamette National Forest has contacted Mary Hamilton, chair of the Obsidian Publicity Committee, to meet with other organizations on April 1 to discuss 50th anniversary local events.

How were Obsidians involved? An article in the February

1955 *Bulletin* notes how Obsidians and other organizations united to work on wilderness legislation for the next 44 years:

On the evening of October 9th, 1954, Karl Onthank, chairman of the science committee of the Obsidians, invited his committee and many conservationists from other cities of Oregon to meet at his home to formulate an organization. This organization was to become the "Friends of the Three Sisters Wilderness Area," with Mr. Onthank and Mike Stahl as co-chairmen, Frances Newsom and Doris Sims as co-secretaries, and Ray Sims as treasurer.

Treasurer's Report: Stewart Hoeg reviewed the Budget-vs-Actual Report and the Balance Sheet. The Board approved payment of the bills.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Summer Trips (Tom Musselwhite): Summer Trips Leader recruitment and schedule development has started.

Winter Trips (Anne Bonine): During February we had seven hikes, two snowshoes & one x-ski involving 57 members and 10 nonmembers. Eight trips were cancelled due to snow conditions.

Climbs (Brian Hamilton): Climb School preparations are continuing. Classes begin on Monday, March 31. Fifteen students have registered so far. There is room for five to nine more, depending on skill levels of the students. The Climbs Committee hopes to have the 2014 climb schedule posted online by the end of the month.

Trail Maintenance (Matthew Bell): There was one outing in February. We worked independently to clear storm debris from the Ridgeline and Tie trails. We met at the Willamette & 52nd trailhead and hiked in. Our work included clearing drainage ditches, raking duff and debris, and removing storm debris from the trail sides. February Trail Maintenance Participation: One outing in Spencer Butte Park. Fourteen participants consisting of eleven members and three nonmembers worked an estimated 49 hours.

Highways and Byways By Bus (Liz Reanier): The Bus Rally, which took place on February 23rd, was attended by 45 people. In appreciation for use of the Lodge for our fall planning sessions and the Bus Rally a donation will be made to the Obsidians general fund.

OUR GROUP OF VOLUNTEERS FOR THIS YEAR'S FIRST OUTING met at the Willamette and 52nd trailhead before continuing a short distance up the trail to meet with Josh

After introductions and a short outline of the day's projects, we grabbed shovels and hoes and headed up to the switchbacks to continue our work to improve that section of the Ridgeline Trail. Birding Along I-5 from San Francisco to Seattle

HARRY FULLER WILL TAKE US ON A VIRTUAL TOUR of good birding spots along the I-5 corridor between Seattle and San Francisco, on Tuesday, March 18 at 7 PM at the Lodge.

His book, *Freeway Birding*, concentrates on locations within a 20-minute drive of a freeway exit. Locations include everything from country roads to city parks to national wildlife refuges. The bird diversity along this route is prodigious.

White-winged scoters, red-breasted mergansers, white-headed woodpeckers, both magpie species and great gray owls can all be seen not far from I-5. Fuller will have copies of *Freeway Birding* to sell and sign.
